

REPORT: How President Trump's FY18 Budget Cuts Essential Programs In Connecticut

I. Risking Safety and Security

- Connecticut received \$1,739,316 in Fiscal Year 2016 from the **Byrne-JAG program**, which is the most flexible local law enforcement grant program, helping with a range of needs including combating gangs and domestic violence and providing for treatment programs. President Trump's budget cuts the program nationwide from FY17 by over \$70 million, a 17% percent cut.
- In 2016, Connecticut received \$3,978,000 in Federal Emergency Management Agency homeland security program funding. FEMA funding helps states and cities prepare for and respond to acts of terrorism and natural disasters, create safer communities, and save money in the long-run.
 - o The budget cuts FEMA funding for programs that help states and cities prepare for and respond to acts of terrorism and natural disasters, including a 25% (\$118 million) cut to the State Homeland Security Grant Program, a 26% (\$156 million) cut to Urban Area Security Initiative, and a 52% (\$104 million) cut to Transit and Port Security grants.

II. Cutting Infrastructure Investment

• The budget <u>ELIMINATES</u> \$500 million in funding from the Transportation Investment Generating Economic Recovery (TIGER) program, which has made hundreds of grants to advance important local transportation priorities, totaling \$20,000,000 in Connecticut in 2016 alone.

III. Jeopardizing Public Health

- President Trump's budget would cut more than \$7 billion from the
 National Institutes of Health (NIH), which funds and conducts lifesaving
 medical research across the country and the globe, including work to develop a cure
 for cancer, fight Alzheimer's disease, and combat the opioid epidemic. In
 Connecticut, NIH funding supports 7,686 jobs and administered \$510,609,681 in
 awards in 2016. President Trump's budget would cut 22 percent of the NIH's
 budget.
- Connecticut received \$4,341,017 in funds through the **Older Americans Act** in Fiscal Year 2016. Older Americans Act funds provide services to support older Americans and their caregivers, such as personal care, home delivered meals,

transportation, legal assistance, information and assistance, and more. Nationwide, President Trump's budget cuts more than **\$135 million** from the Administration for Community Living, which administers programs under the Older Americans Act.

- Medicaid covers 1 in 5 Americans, including many with complex and costly needs for medical care and long-term services. In Connecticut, Medicaid covers 856,100 low-income children, adults, seniors, and people with disabilities.
 - President Trump budget slashes more than \$1 trillion from Medicaid nationwide over the next ten years. This is on top of cuts to the Medicaid program in the House-passed Trumpcare bill. Last year, Connecticut utilized \$7,886,642,781 in federal Medicaid funding.

IV. Rural America

- In 2016, Connecticut used \$4,045,000 in funds through the USDA water and wastewater infrastructure programs. These funds give small communities funding for clean, reliable drinking water and sanitary waste disposal. These communities may otherwise be unable to access credit they need to keep their water clean and safe. President Trump's budget <u>ELIMINATES</u> this program entirely, a cut of \$530 million from 2016.
- Connecticut received N/A in 2016 funding through the Distance Learning and Telemedicine grant program, which supports rural communities disconnected from educational opportunity or access to quality healthcare. President Trump's budget <u>ELIMINATES</u> DLT grants entirely, a cut of \$46 million from 2016.
- Connecticut utilized \$250,000 in grants from the Community Facilities Loan and Grant program, which assists rural communities in accessing over \$2 billion in capital to build schools, hospitals, community centers, police stations, and other vital public facilities. President Trump's budget <u>ELIMINATES</u> Community Facilities grants entirely, a cut of \$46 million from 2016.

V. Education

- President Trump's budget guts federal support for higher education, cutting \$1.2
 billion from federal student aid by <u>ELIMINATING</u> the Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants and reducing Federal Work-Study, which could mean a loss of more than \$8,845,924 for Connecticut students.
- Connecticut's children received \$9,056,726 through the 21st Century
 Community Learning Centers program in 2016, which funds before school,
 afterschool, and summer learning programs that work to improve student academic
 outcomes across the country. President Trump's budget <u>ELIMINATES</u> this
 program entirely, cutting \$1.16 billion nationwide from school aid.

VI. Jobs and Job Training

• The Employment and Training Administration, which provides training, unemployment insurance benefits, labor market information, supports **5,856** active

apprentices in Connecticut. Trump's budget cuts \$1.3 billion from the Administration, a 38 percent cut.

• In Connecticut, **Manufacturing Extension Partnerships** created or preserved **1,752** jobs through **\$1,476,247** in funding last year alone. MEPs are public-private partnerships that help small struggling manufacturers in all 50 states develop innovation strategies to grow and hire new employees. President Trump's budget **ELIMINATES** the program entirely, a nationwide cut of **\$135,000,000**¹³.

VII. Community Economic Development

- In 2016, 11 Community Development Financial Institutions in Connecticut originated \$27.8 million in loans and investments for 32 businesses. CDFIs offer resources, grants, and programs to revitalize distressed communities through certified financial institutions. President Trump's budget cuts \$248 million from FY17 funding, a nationwide cut of 94 percent.
- Connecticut created or preserved 147 jobs and leveraged \$946,667 through the Economic Development Administration, which promotes innovation and competitiveness to build sustainable job growth and durable regional economies around the country. President Trump's budget <u>ELIMINATES</u> the Administration entirely, a cut of \$221 million¹⁴.
- Connecticut received \$35,627,649 in funds from Community Development
 Block Grants. CDBG funds local community development initiatives that support
 jobs, housing, and public services for millions of low-and moderate-income
 Americans. President Trump's budget <u>ELIMINATES</u> the program entirely, a cut of
 \$3 billion.
- Connecticut leveraged \$10,906,329 in funding from the HOME investment
 partnerships program partners localities and nonprofit groups to build, buy, and
 repair affordable housing. President Trump's budget <u>ELIMINATES</u> the program
 entirely, a cut of \$950 million from FY17.

VIII. Clean Air and Water

• Connecticut received \$14,670,460 in funds from EPA categorical grants in 2016. President Trump's budget slashes these grants by 45%, a cut of nearly \$500 million. These grants support state programs that detect and remove radon, lead, and hazardous waste, assess and clean up contaminated sites, manage air quality, and preserve wetlands.

IX. Families and Seniors

• The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program helps low-income families afford a nutritionally adequate diet, nearly 70 percent of which are families with children. Connecticut families received \$685,510,011 in SNAP assistance in 2016.

President Trump's budget cuts the program by more than 25 percent (\$193 billion over ten years), a devastating loss for families that utilize SNAP to put food on the table.

- Connecticut residents received \$8,068,989 in funding from the Low Income
 Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) to provide funding to assist lowincome Americans with their energy bills, allowing them access to heat in the winter.
 President Trump's budget <u>ELIMINATES</u> the program entirely.
 - LIHEAP helped 90,661 households in Connecticut, including 62,534 households with elderly occupants, people with disabilities, and children under 5.
 - o By eliminating the program, the budget cuts **\$3.38 billion**, and would leave seniors, people with disabilities, and working Americans without heat.
- Connecticut used \$2,450,480 in funds from the Weatherization Assistance
 Program. The WAP has led the nation in advancing technology, research and work
 practices to make residential energy upgrades cost effective, safe and comprehensive.
 President Trump's budget <u>ELIMINATES</u> the program, driving up energy bills for
 vulnerable families.
- USDA's Rental Assistance Program provided \$9,131,090 to help very-low and low-income families in rural communities make rent in Connecticut in 2016. President Trump's budget would slash assistance to working rural families by \$45 million.
- **Meals on Wheels,** a nonprofit that delivers hot meals to 2.4 million senior citizens every year, is funded in part by the Older Americans Act and Community Development Block Grant funds. Trump's budget would slash the federal programs that helped deliver **2,054,206** meals to **23,526** seniors in Connecticut in 2016.
